The Club



Pultneyville Yacht Club was established in 1944 for the purpose of promoting good fellowship on land and good fun and sportsmanship at sea. To accomplish these goals we actively promote and develop yachting and all allied activities through our own efforts and in cooperation of other yachting organizations.

The club averages approximately 75 members in several membership categories, with the vast majority being full voting members. We also offer docks for rent to non-members.

We have monthly Executive Committee meetings, three full membership meetings a year - all to maintain the club operation and take care of club business.

We also publish a *PYC Log* for membership lists, club history, and by-laws, and a monthly newsletter called the *Lake Soundings*.



The Facilities

The **main facilities** of the club include a full three-season clubhouse with kitchen, bathrooms, shower facilities, and a comfortable meeting room for indoor gathering. We also have an open-air pavilion for club events, picnics, and family dinners. The pavilion is equipped with lights, gas grills and many picnic tables for the members' convenience.

Boating facilities include a boat ramp, two gin poles for masts, and a forklift for general heavy work. We also have a new pump out station for members and guests to use. We hire a crane and operators to help us haul and launch yachts in the fall and spring. Seasoned members are always happy to mentor members new to boating and the exciting yacht club experience.



The club grounds include: a playground for the kids, a volleyball / green area, access to the lake, picturesque picnic areas overlooking the lake, a small camping area, long-term parking area for people out on cruise, and dockside parking.

Nearby: stroll to historic Pultneyville, ice cream, post office, antique shopping, bed and breakfast, restaurant, and a community theater.

The Boating

We have a mix of sail and powerboat owners in the club. All enjoy boating activities at various skill levels. The sailors have an active race program on Thursday nights throughout the season. There are also fun races and ladies skipper's races for the serious and not serious racers. Many racers and non-racers participate in races and other boating activities around the lake year round. Members with a variety of sail and power boating experience co-mingle to make for a lively club atmosphere.



Many boaters cruise to various Lake Ontario ports as part of their summer cruising. With a reputation of being the friendliest club on the lake, PYC offers full reciprocal privileges to clubs around the lake.



Often members take short cruises to the sandy bottom areas near the harbor for an afternoon of gathering, swimming and relaxing on the hook. The club sponsors a Commodore's Review, Commodores' Race Challenge with the nearby Mariners, a fun race, and club wide cruises for all boats throughout the year.

The Social Life

Throughout the entire year we have a busy social calendar for the members. The summer season is full of picnics around major holidays, a Roast, Clambake, New Members' Reception, joint events with The Mariners across the harbor, evening campfires and club cruises. Impromptu gatherings occur often at the clubhouse, in the picnic pavilion and on the docks.



During the winter season, we have a fall banquet, full membership meeting and winter cabin party. All intended to have fun and to keep us in contact as we wait for the boating season to start.

The Work Life

PYC is a working club. Some events are actually work days. Workdays are devoted to cleaning and fixing our facilities, and a day each is devoted to hauling and launching boats and moving cradles. None of the work is very hard and the work is shared by all members. The working approach enables us to keep our costs low. It is also an opportunity to talk to others about boating in a way that develops great friendships and camaraderie like no other.

From Rochester and West: Route 104 East to Williamson, then turn left onto Route 21 North. About 4 miles ahead, go straight at 4-way intersection onto dirt road - Hamilton, St Ext. Yellow clubhouse will be to the right at the top of the first hill.

From Oswego and East: Route 104 West to Williamson, then turn right onto Route 21 North. About 4 miles ahead, go straight at 4-way intersection onto dirt road - Hamilton, St Ext. Clubhouse will be at the top of the first hill to the right.
